Application Instructions:

Please fill out the following application completely and thoroughly. The 2019 application enrollment period is open from **April 8 – October 15.** The WSR Vision Council and Save The Waves Coalition will announce the results of the selection process sometime at the end of 2021.

Applications should be submitted via email to <u>trent@savethewaves.org</u> in a single PDF document including all attachments to be considered. **Submissions need to be made by October 15, 2021, at 5 pm (PST).**

Background Information:

World Surfing Reserves is an initiative designed to enshrine and protect the world's greatest surf spots: the most sacred, cherished, environmentally rich and culturally significant areas. The program proactively designates and preserves outstanding waves, surf zones and their surrounding environments, around the world. It serves as a global model for protecting wave breaks and their surrounding areas by recognizing the positive environmental, social, cultural and economic benefits of waves. Before submitting an application, please read the World Surfing Reserves Frequently Asked Questions document.

WSR eligible surf ecosystems are evaluated based on the following criteria:

- 1) Quality and consistency of the wave or surf zone;
- 2) Environmental characteristics of the area;
- 3) Surf & ocean culture as well as the history of surfing and ocean sports in the region;
- 4) Local community support
- 5) Priority conservation region

Minimum criteria to become a World Surfing Reserve must include the following:

- 1) World class wave or surf zone in terms of quality and consistency;
- 2) Unique and diverse environmental characteristics of the area;
- 3) Rich, documented surf & ocean culture, as well as history of the area;
- 4) Strong community support and capacity evidenced by government, NGO, surf community, business, and general support from community members.



Note: If the above minimum criteria are not met or any of the elements in the enclosed application are not properly completed, World Surfing Reserves will notify you to either request additional information, or to inform you that the site does not meet the minimum criteria. Incomplete applications may delay the review process.

Application Template: Each World Surfing Reserve applicant can be creative with the format and look of their application. We encourage lots of photos, maps, and graphics in order for the Vision Council to get a holistic picture of the area. However, the application must include ALL of the information below in an organized and easy-to-read format. <u>Please submit your application in English.</u>

Eligible WSR sites and surf zones are evaluated and chosen based on the following criteria:

I. Quality and Consistency (Max 500 words)

Please include a thorough description of the wave(s) characteristics including any climate, wave pattern, and, meteorological information that helps display wave quality and consistency. Graphs that display wave patterns and characteristics are especially pertinent. This may also include images. Please give particular attention to the following criteria:

- Quality of wave(s)
- Surf-able days a year
- History/current professional surf contests
- Wave variety (points, beach-break, reef, etc.)

II. Unique Environmental Characteristics (Max 750 Words)

Please consider what makes the coastal environment and surf ecosystem around the proposed WSR boundaries significant, unique, and/or sensitive. Please provide or reference any relevant scientific data to biological, geological, and geophysical studies that have been conducted in the area. Please give particular attention to the following criteria:

- Recognized biodiversity hotspots
- Threatened species present
- Connected to water resources
- Past/present/future wave threats
- Protected area designations (state parks, federal protected areas, IUCN recognized, etc.)
- Undeveloped area (amount of open land without significant infrastructure, public or private)
- Key issues identified



- Clear avenue for protection identified
- Provides key ecosystem services

III. Surf Culture, Ocean Culture, Indigenous Culture & Additional History of the Area (Max 750 Words)

Please outline the significance of the local surf culture, ocean culture, indigenous culture, or other related history pertaining to this application with particular attention to the following criteria:

- Site of national cultural significance
- Importance in surf history
- Site of regional significance

IV. Community Support

(Max 750 words)

The World Surfing Reserves program depends on the, on-going support from the surfing and conservation communities at the local, national, and international level. Please outline how the local community will mobilize in support of the activities of the WSR, with particular attention to the following criteria:

- Securing community cohesion in support of a World Surfing Reserve designation
- Existence of sustainable financing opportunities for implementation of the WSR

Vision Council Process

Save The Waves will work with each submitting party to ensure the application includes the most necessary information. The Vision Council then meets several times to discuss the merits of each application and also scores them based on the preceding criteria. However, the application that scores the highest in the criteria is not necessarily chosen as the World Surfing Reserve. The highest scoring applications are reviewed further by the Vision Council and other considerations are taken into account including local capacity, relevance to the WSR network, potential successful stewardship projects, global conservation targets, and more.
